

Flexible Spending Accounts

Beginning January 1, 2011, over-the-counter (OTC) drugs, medicines and biologicals will be required to be accompanied by a physician's prescription in order to be reimbursed. The list below includes generally eligible medical flexible spending account expenses. OTC items marked with a ◆ require a note of medical necessity from a licensed practitioner.

Remember:

- 1. Stockpiling of supplies is prohibiting by the IRS.
- 2. Services must be rendered or items purchased during your plan year.
- 3. You must use your flex account money during the plan year or it is forfeited.
